Divide teachers into three "expert" groups (A, B & C). Assign each group the corresponding topic below. Let the groups know that each person in the group will be responsible for teaching others about their topic. Give the groups about 15 minutes to look through materials and discuss key points about what they learned. After teachers review the resources, teachers will meet with a "home" group of three (one person from each "letter" so the new group has A-B-C). Have the representative from each group teach the rest of the group about their topic and then listen to the others in their group to learn about the other topics.


